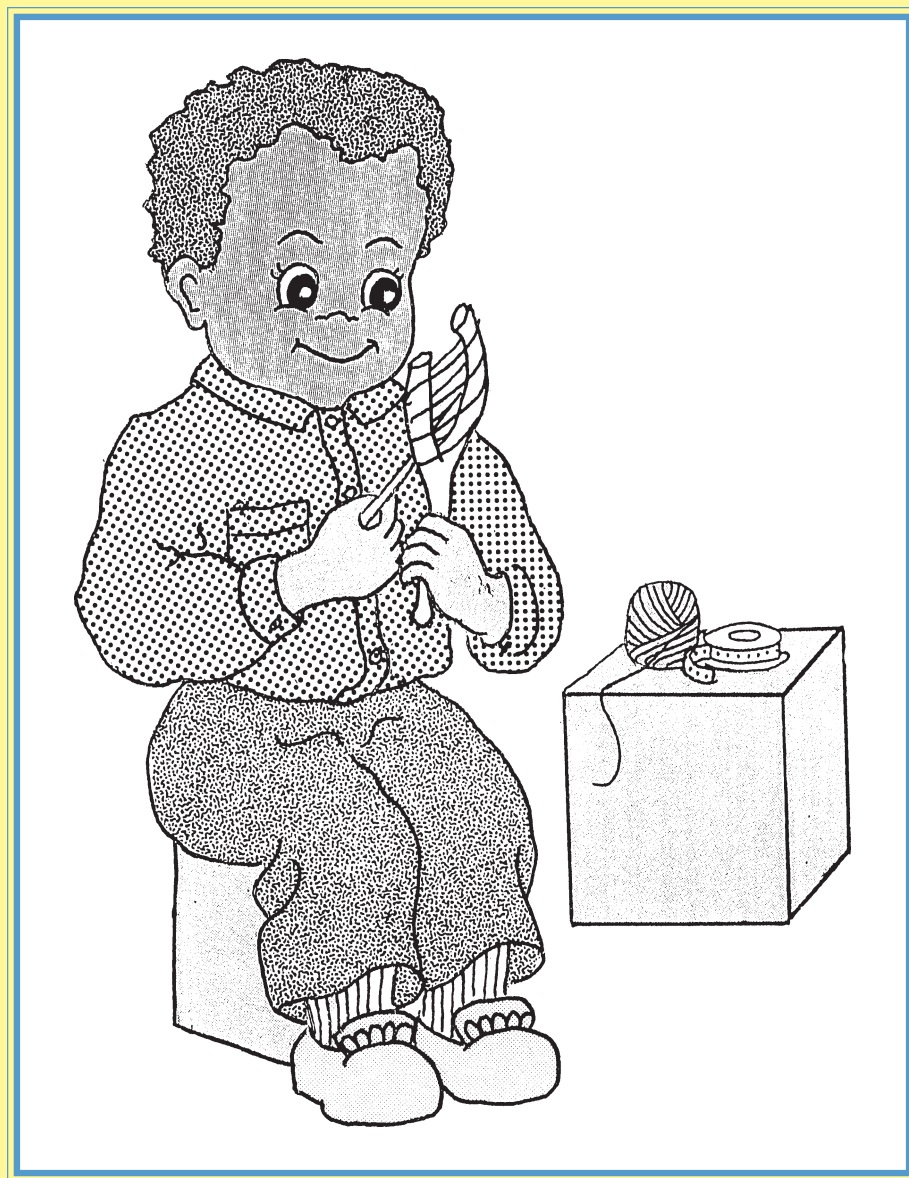

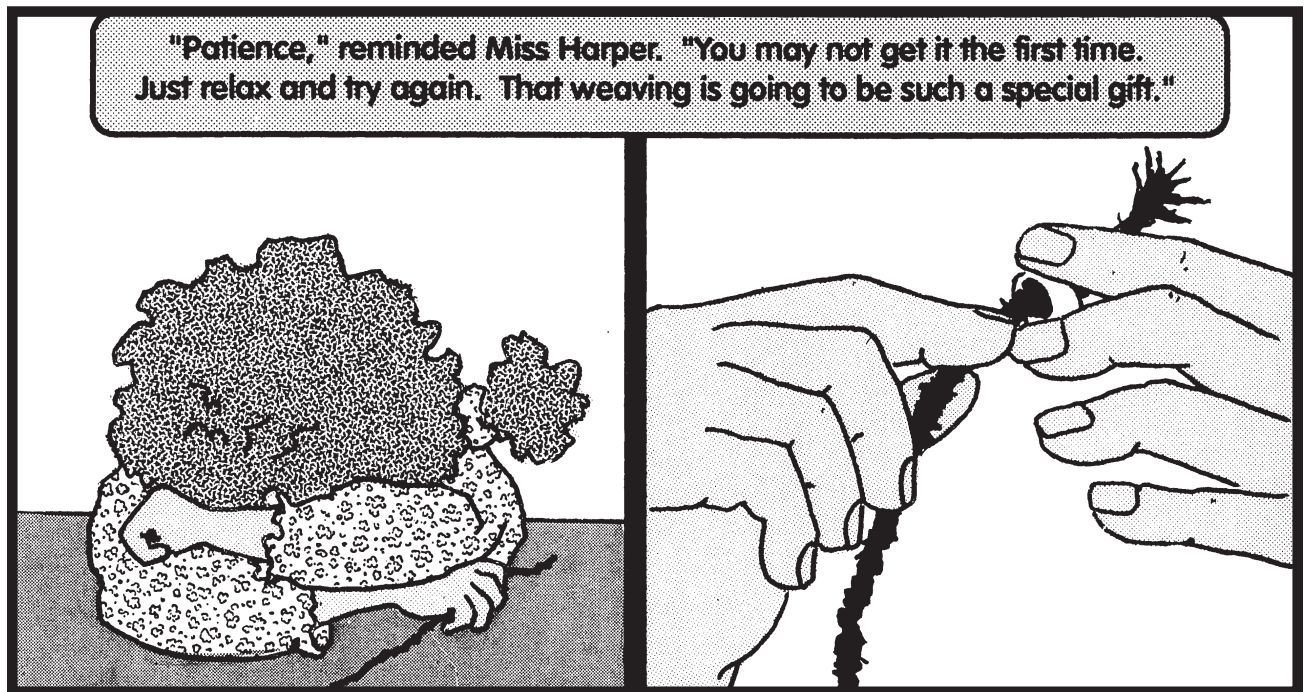

Hebrews 12:1

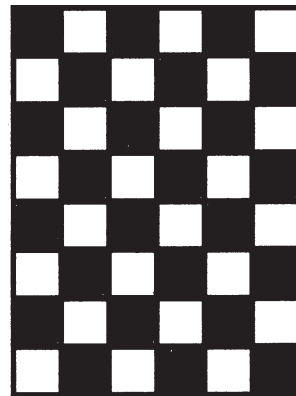


Pick out one thing that you have to use patience for and write it in the space below. Underneath it, write down the good that will come out of using patience for the thing you wrote down.

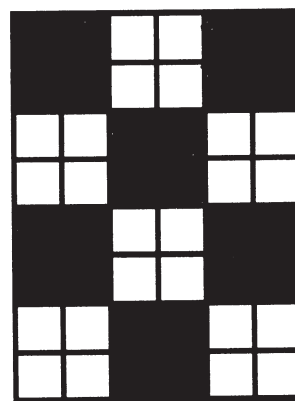
B. WEAVING WITH PAPER

Today we will use paper instead of wool to make a weaving. We will also learn the names of two different weaving patterns.

The kind of weaving we have been doing on the branch and on the loom is called a plain or **tabby weave**. It is a simple *over one, under one* pattern. When you do it with paper, it looks like this:



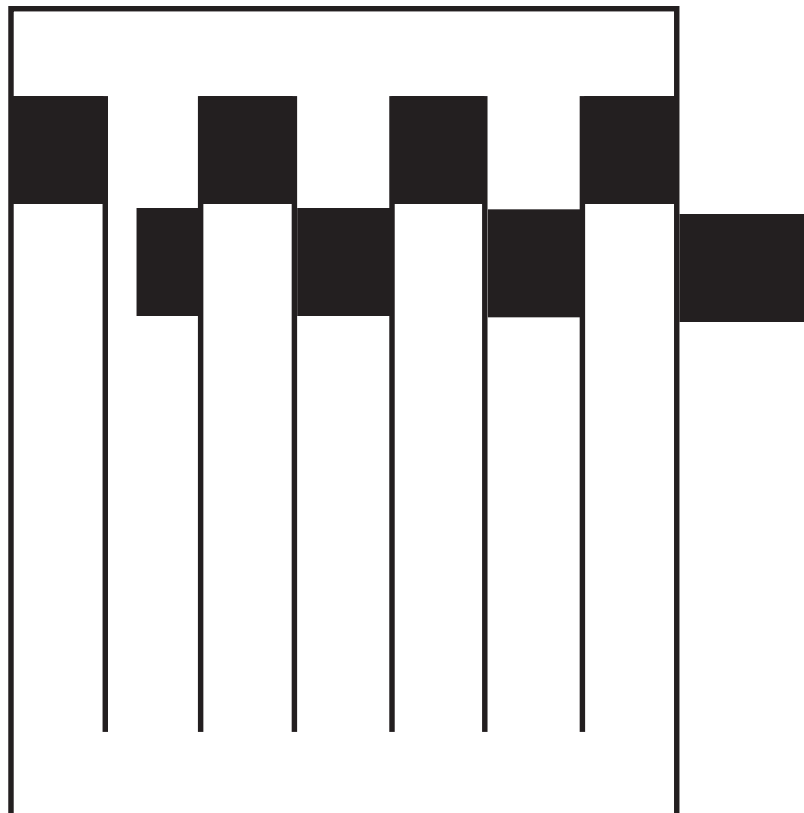
Another weaving pattern is called the **basket weave**. Instead of going *over one* and *under one*, we go *over two* and *under two*. We start at the edge with *over* for two rows and then we start at the edge again with *under* for two rows.



C. WEAVING PATTERNS

To make a tabby pattern, weave one of the strips into the warp by starting *over one, under the next*, and *over the next* all the way along the row.

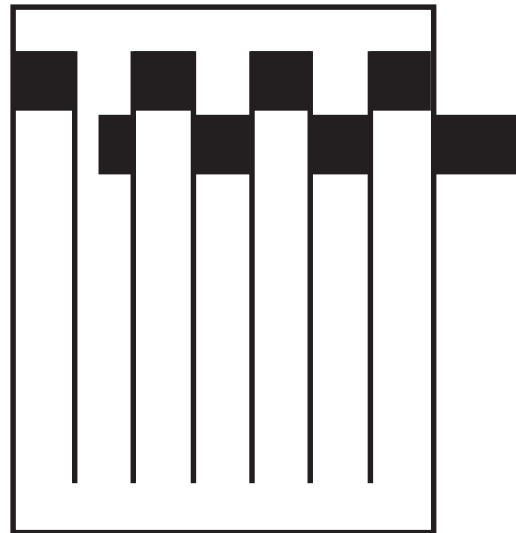
When you do the second row, start the opposite way. If you started with *over one* in the first row, then start with *under one* in the second row. See the picture below:

OTHER THINGS TO TRY:

1. Make up a pattern of your own.
2. Change the colors of the weft strips as you weave.
3. Lay the weft strips in different directions.
4. Cut out an interesting shape like a heart and weave paper strips into the heart shape. You could even cut out the shape of a dress and weave a tiny pattern into the skirt.
