Poster Making

Objectives:

- To continue to work on the poster begun last week.
- To be familiar with and able to use the terms graphic artist, image, lettering, unity, calligraphy, serif, sans serif, upright, italic, outline, script.

Materials:

- **②** CHOOSE ART STUDENT WORKBOOK page 16
- All materials (as required) from last class

Advance Preparation:

Lay out papers, pictures, and all other supplies in an orderly manner.

Method:

Step 1: Scripture Talk

Review the scripture and read the cartoon on page 16 of the student workbook. Remind the students that last class they learned the importance of not only forgiving but also forgetting about an incident once the offense has been forgiven. Dwelling on the good in people instead of the bad helps us to forget. We won't doubt a person's good intentions if we think well of them. Read Philippians 4:8 with the children and remind them to look for the good in others. Have them answer **This means I must** (look for the good in others).

But sometimes an incident that has been forgiven will come back to our remembrance. When we dwell on the memory of the offense either by thinking about it or talking about it, we risk taking the hurt back all over again. Then we

have to forgive again in our hearts. To avoid that, we can simply refuse to think or to talk about it again and turn our thoughts toward something else. The Bible advises us to do just that in II Corinthians 10:5. Read the scripture together and have the students answer: **This** weans I wust (remember that I have forgiven and refuse to think about it).

Step 2: Working on the Posters

Have the children continue their poster making from last class. Sharing among the group some of the ideas being used and the progress of the work to this point.

When discussing the posters, use the following terms wherever appropriate: graphic artist, image, lettering, unity, calligraphy, serif, sans serif, upright, italic, outline, and script.
