

Encourage the children to experiment with additional prints using different colors of paper or ink. Remind them that pictures for books were made from some of Dürer's woodcuts, since multiple prints of the same image were needed. When the ink has dried, the image of the rhinoceros can be cut out or displayed as is.

### Expanding the project (optional):

*Please note:* For the following projects, have the students **cut out the styrofoam rhinoceros plates** before using them to print on the cloth. This will provide an image of the rhino, only, and not the surrounding background. If you plan

to wash the fabric afterwards, you must use permanent ink.

- Using unbleached cotton, make a wall-hanging, decorating it with a checkerboard pattern of rhino prints. In a small class, each student could repeat his or her rhino image several times, printing a whole row of rhinos.
- Sew your own cotton skirt and have the students decorate it with rhino prints.
- Schedule an extra class and design drawings for t-shirts, quilt pieces or pillow cases.
